
15. RADIARIA, CRINOIDEA, &c.—The crinoidea, or lily-shaped animals, are but sparingly distributed in the chalk—a circumstance, as you will hereafter

find, strikingly contrasting with the zoological characters of the older secondary formations. Stems of encrinites occur in the chalk and galt; and there is a small species of apiocrinite, which is peculiar to this formation.* The most remarkable fossil of this class is the marsupite, which I have thus named from its resemblance, when closed, to a purse. The marsupite (Tab. 51) was a molluscous animal, of a
