with these remains; but the two plants above named constitute by far the greatest proportion of the fossil vegetables of Tilgate Forest. My cabinet

contains a remarkable specimen, in which the parts of fructification are beautifully preserved in a silicified state (Tab. 74). Leaves of cycadeæ, and seed-vessels of restiaceæ, occur in the ironstone of Heathfield in Sussex; they are supposed to be of the same species as specimens from Bornholm. Among the plants from Heathfield are impressions which bear a close resemblance to those of the foliage of the cypress; while others appear to be referable to fuci.
