
and the posterior pair relatively larger than in any other crustacean. Two species are described; the one is five, the other about four inches long.\* In the Carboniferous strata at Burdie-house, near Edinburgh, two species of this curious genus have been discovered by Dr. Hibbert, both of which are very large, their length being estimated at from twelve to eighteen inches.<sup>†</sup>
