



Asterophylliteæ.—These plants belong to the Acrogens, but have the aspect of aster flowers, and hence the name of the family. They were not numerous, but quite peculiar. Fig. 241, exhibits a species of Annularia. Fig. 242 shows the Spenophyllum emarginatum, another genus of these plants.
