MAP OF PART OF THE NORTH-WEST OF EUROPE, INCLUDING THE BRITISH ISLES, SHOWING THE EXTENT OF SEA WHICH WOULD BECOME LAND IF THERE WERE A GENERAL RISE OF THE AREA TO THE EXTENT OF 600 FEET.

The darker shade expresses what is now land, the lighter shade the space intervening between the present coast line and the 100 fathom line, which would be converted by such a movement into land.

The original of this map will be found in Sir H. de la Beche's 'Theoretical Researches,' p. 190, 1834, but several important corrections have been introduced into it from recently published Admiralty Surveys, especially —

1st. A deep channel passing from the North Sea into the entrance of the Baltic.

2nd. The more limited westerly extension of the West Coast of Ireland.
